



Do I need an influenza (flu) vaccine if I'm worried about COVID-19?

Why should I worry about flu?

Flu has killed more people than COVID-19. Across the world, about three to five million people get very ill each year from flu and have to see a doctor for complications or even have to go to hospital. Of these people, about 290 000 to 650 000 people die every year from flu.

What can I do to protect myself from flu and COVID-19?

How to protect yourself and your family from viruses:

- Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Wash your hands after using public transport, after using the bathroom and before touching food.
- Don't touch your eyes, nose or mouth with unwashed hands.
- Cough into the fold of your elbow or use a tissue. Coughing into your hand or fist spreads the germs into the air
- Stay home if you're sick.
